Library Renewal Project

The PG Library Renewal Project took a significant step forward this month with the opening of bids on July 19. Three bids were received; the lowest bid seems within the Project estimates. City staff are reviewing the bid specifics before preparing a recommendation to bring to the City Council at an August meeting.

Staff are also preparing an August recommendation for Council to enter into a lease agreement for temporary Library use of portions of the Holman building, on Lighthouse Avenue, during the estimated 10-12 months of the Library Renewal Project.

Once Council awards the construction contract for the Library Renewal Project and approves the lease terms for the temporary Library location during the construction project, the dates for moving the Library and beginning construction will be set. Library staff will be providing more information as to future open hours, programs, book returns and more. Stay tuned!

Business Spotlight Friends Monthly Book Sale

Saturday, August 3, marks the third month at St. Mary's-by-the-Sea Episcopal Church for the Friends monthly book sale. Not only have the donors to these sales managed to find their way to the new location at 12th and Central Avenues, the bibliophiles have as well!

Customers say they appreciate how pleasant it is to browse shelved books indoors, rather than search through books in boxes. With plants and cheerful helpers, "It feels like a real bookstore!" enthused Friends Board member Linda Pagnella.

The Friends "recycled books" bookstore nearly overflows with all manner of literature, non-fiction (lots and lots of biographies and history), art and cookbooks, music CDs, videos, puzzles and an entire section devoted to books and videos for children and young adults. And collectors take note! There's an area of rare books, curated by Mary Ann and Ben Whitten, that really merits serious exploration.

As an added incentive, from 10 am to 4 pm on August 3, all "red dot" books will be 5 for \$1, as the Friends clear the shelves of winter donations to make room for new treasures. And a tip for bargain-hunters - after 1 pm the crowds thin out, leaving lots of elbow room for browsing.

Come by and see for yourself at the next Friends book sale on Saturday, August 3, from 10 am to 4 pm at St. Mary's-by-the-Sea, on the corner of Central and 12th Avenues in Pacific Grove. Every dollar raised goes to buy new books and materials for PG Library!

Or if "too many books and not enough time" best describes you, donations of gently used, CLEAN books (not textbooks or moldy or falling apart!) are welcomed Monday, Tuesday and Friday mornings from 10 am to noon at St Mary's.

From The Foundation "What Happens to My Donation?"

On June 19, the PG City Council approved the City's 2019-2020 budget. As the new fiscal year begins, it's time for an annual process you may not be aware of:

When the new library budget is approved, the PG Public Library director and the presidents of the Friends and Foundation meet to discuss the budget for the new fiscal year and decide together (1) what is needed to supplement that budget and (2) where those additional funds will come from. There are three sources of supplemental funding:

- •the Friends' general funds (from memberships, book sales, Dine Out, and Author events)
- •the Foundation's endowment fund, from which there is an annual distribution
- •the jointly held PGPL Fund for the Future (unrestricted donations received by either Friends or Foundation).

When you decide to make a donation to "the Library," you have several choices.

- •Gifts to "PG Public Library" go into City funds.
- •Gifts to the "Friends of PG Library" or "PG Library Foundation" go directly to work: some for current expenditures and some invested for future needs (at rates far higher than City funds can earn).

Donations can be either unrestricted or restricted. Unrestricted gifts to either the Friends or Foundation go into the Fund for the Future.

Restricted gifts are set aside for the purpose specified: a donor may want to add to the Foundation's endowment fund to help build financial security for our library's future. Or a donor's gift might be for books and materials, children's programs, the Renewal Project, or another special interest. All you have to do is make your preference known. Unrestricted gifts allow the most flexibility, but all donations are very much appreciated.

Your donations now—or planned gifts from your estate—help pay for the materials and programs we all value so much, and they help ensure the future financial health of our beloved Carnegie library. It's easy to help:

Summer Reading at the Library

Nearly 400 children participated in "A Universe of Stories" summer reading program at the PG Library this June and July, thanks to the Friends. Hundreds of books were read, while shrieks of laughter, voices raised in song, and gasps of amazement were heard every Wednesday from June 5th until July 24th.

The 2019 summer reading program was originally anticipated to be held in City parks, as it was hoped that the 10-12 month Renewal Project work would be underway before June. However, Project delays meant the Library was still open this summer and available for performers, musicians, and more.

Thanks to generous 2018 Monterey County Gives! donors, a grant was received to help with higher than expected programming costs to keep children reading and learning outside the Library when school was out. Those funds are being held for next year's summer reading in the parks, as the construction project is likely to extend into summer 2020.

Much appreciation goes to Alison Jackson, PG Library's highenergy children's librarian and award-winning children's book author, for another wonderful summer reading season. Alison has provided year-round programs for babies, preschoolers, elementary-age youngsters and more, plus planning for summer reading every year, plus selecting children's material, plus children's reference help - all while working a half-time schedule. Alison will be enjoying a well-deserved retirement, and will be greatly missed!

And join us in welcoming new children's librarian Mary Weyant. Mary has a background as a school librarian and teacher, and has been with the Library for over six months. We know our popular and much-loved children's programs will be in good hands.
